Tips

For numbers in the hundreds, the British usually say "and" but the Americans usually do not say "and":

British English

120 = one hundred and twenty

American English

120 = one hundred twenty

Note that in English, we usually separate the digits of numbers over 999 with a comma (.). We count 3 digits from the right and insert a comma, like this:

1 , 0 0 0 one thousand

1 , 0 0 0 , 0 0 0 one million

1 2 , 7 5 0 , 2 0 0 twelve million, seven hundred and fifty thousand, two hundred

We use a point (.) to indicate a decimal number, or to separate dollars from cents, pounds from pennies and so on. Here are some examples:

0 . 1 = one tenth or 1/10

1 . 0 = one

1 , 0 0 0 = one thousand

1 , 5 0 0 . 7 5 = one thousand five hundred and three quarters

\$ 1 . 5 0 = one dollar and fifty cents

\$ 7 0 0 . 0 0 = seven hundred dollars

£ 3 , 5 0 0 . 0 1 = three thousand five hundred pounds and one penny

Tips

Be careful with commas and points. Some languages use them in the opposite way!

snowman out in the yard. Sometimes we also make a snowball. We also ski and sledge. It is really fun.

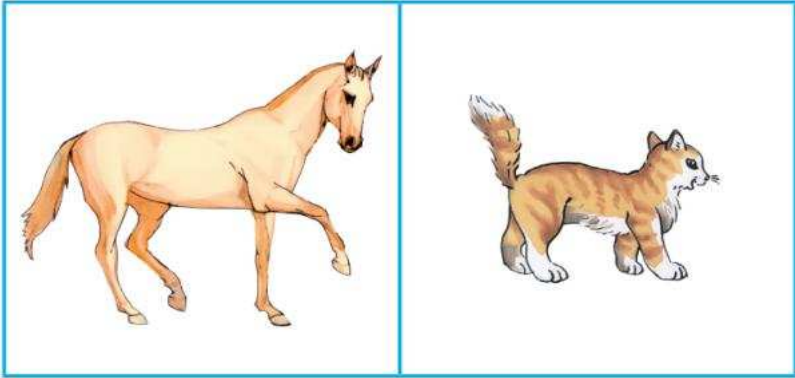

By and by the Wolves were both so very hungry that the Wolf asked his mate to try once more to catch the Goat.

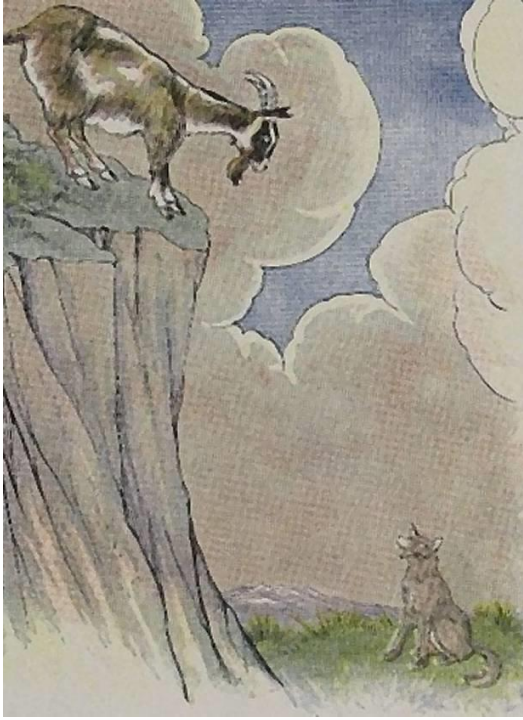
